The City and Tennessee Brew Works continue to make progress on turning the old LCUB Building over to the Industrial Development Board (IDB) of Lenoir City in order for the IDB to turn the property over to them for their use as a restaurant, brewery, and music venue space. The owner of Tennessee Brew Works will be giving an update on this exciting



project in downtown at the April 8, 2024 City Council Meeting at 6:00 PM. We encourage you to either attend the meeting, or we invite you to watch the meeting live stream on YouTube Channel Loudon TV3. We look forward to the grand opening of this new business coming soon!

The installation of the new traffic signal on Highway 321 at City Park Drive and Elm Hill Drive was bid for construction in December, and TDOT awarded the construction contract to Progression Electric, LLC in January. At the end of February, TDOT held a Pre-Construction conference for all the parties. TDOT shared that they anticipate construction activities to begin in April and to be completed this Fall. As you probably know, we are running this through TDOT, and we are on their timeline. Once installed, the signal will add much more safety when navigating that particular intersection.

Summer is just around the corner! Many folks may have already planned their summer vacations or posted online their excitement about better weather being just around the corner. Social media can be a wonderful tool that allows us to share our ideas, photos, catch up with friends and family, or even seek advice from others. However, in the law enforcement community we know that there is a fine line between feeling connected and protecting your information.

There are numerous ways that your information can be compromised and weakened through the various social media platforms. Facebook, Instagram, TikTok, X (formerly known as Twitter), or even via e-mail may become avenues by which information is shared unknowingly. "Clicking" on links can introduce viruses or malware that harvest data from your computer or phone. Popular enough, and as "fun" as they may be, surveys and quizzes that tell us our personality type, our true love, or other frivolous information usually serve as a means for potential hackers to obtain sensitive information which may later lead to identity theft. It is so tempting to fill out the quizzes and surveys; but should be avoided.

Romance and lottery scams remain at the top of the list when we identify ways victims are approached. We have published information about romance scams in the past. The con artists that target victims of romance scams seek those who may have suffered the loss of a spouse, or simply respond to a "phishing" type message. Opportunity and timing can create the "perfect storm," so to speak. The scammer will try to quickly develop rapport with the victim. Shortly after the initial connection, they will profess their love and desire to be together. However, the scammer will then likely have some sort of "tragic" or dire situation that finds them in need of money. They will insist that the money needed is only a loan or temporary solution until they can access their own funds or overcome whatever dire strait they have encountered. The victim may be asked to send cash, wire transfers, payment apps, or even cryptocurrency. Any type of request from someone you have known for a brief time, should immediately throw up "Red Flags." Please call our office if you have any uncertainty as to whether you are being swindled.

Lastly, as vacation season is upon us there are several things you can do to protect your home.

Request additional patrols of the residence by calling non-emergency dispatch (865-458-9081) or the Lenoir City Police Department (865-986-2005).

- Stop mail and papers when you are away from your home for extended periods of time. Keep your lawn mowed while you are away.
- Set timers on interior and exterior lights. Give the appearance that someone is always home.
- Do not advertise that you will be away from home. Social media is not the place to publicize your upcoming vacation!
- Call your home alarm system provider to notify them of your vacation plans.
- Remove hidden house keys that may be stored around the home's exterior.

Stopping fraud and the criminal element will always begin with identifying trends in crime and making the public aware of the tactics used to steal or hurt the victims. Unfortunately, there is no shortage of folks who wish to defraud others. We must be vigilant in our search for knowledge, ability to deter, and our mechanisms to defeat crime. ■

The Venue: 2023 A Year in Review & A Brand Refresh

Just over half of the number of events hosted at The Venue in 2023 were for charitable, educational, governmental, and association organizations. Regarding revenue, these events accounted for just under 44% of total revenue generated.

In addition to the numerous charitable non-profit fundraisers hosted last year, clients also counted in this category are UT-Battelle, TVA, UT Medical Center, Knoxville Metro Drug Coalition, and area chambers of commerce, among others. Also included in this category are area school functions (proms, senior banquets, sports celebrations, band banquets, etc.) for the Lenoir City, Loudon, Farragut, Hardin Valley, and McMinn County school systems.

The remaining 26% of hosted events and revenue generated were from corporate and business clients. Types of events ranged from meetings, trainings, Christmas and other parties, workshops, and continuing education, to name a few. The types of industries most represented included banking, insurance, real estate, manufacturing, healthcare, construction, and retail.

Looking ahead, fiscal year 23-24 projected revenues already exceed those for the previous fiscal year. The Venue also underwent a brand refresh heading into 2024, to update its printed and digital marketing assets.

The Venue's scheduled office hours are Tuesdays through Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., with after-hours and weekend tours & meetings by appointment, based on availability. Due to our busy event calendar, appointments are always

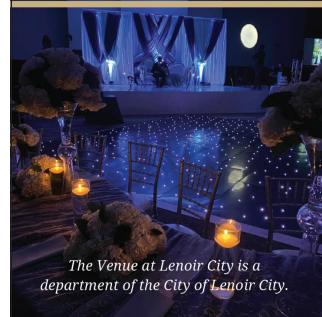

Fire Prevention Message: Answers to frequent questions about smoke alarms

What types of smoke alarms can I buy?

There are many brands of smoke alarms on the market, but they fall under 2 basic types: ionization and photoelectric.

Ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms detect different types of fires. Since no one can predict what type of fire might start in their home, the U.S. Fire Administration recommends that every home and place where people sleep have:

- Both ionization AND photoelectric smoke alarms, OR
- Dual-sensor smoke alarms, which contain both ionization and photoelectric smoke sensors.

Choose interconnected smoke alarms so that when one sounds, they all sound.

There are also alarms for people with hearing loss. These alarms may have strobe lights that flash and/or vibrate to alert those who are unable to hear standard smoke alarms when they sound.

Where do I put smoke alarms in my home?

- Put smoke alarms inside and outside each bedroom and sleeping area. A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.

- Put alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Put smoke alarms on the ceiling or high on the wall. Check the manufacturer's instructions for the best place for your alarm.
- Only qualified electricians should install hardwired smoke alarms.

Lenoir City Fire Departments will install battery-operated smoke alarms in your home at no cost. The nonemergency phone number for more information (865) 986-2310, this program is funded through a grant sponsored by the Tennessee State Fire Marshal's Office.

How do I take care of my smoke alarm?

Is your smoke alarm still working? A smoke alarm with a dead or missing battery is the same as having no smoke alarm at all. A smoke alarm only works when it is properly installed and regularly tested. Take care of your smoke alarms according to the manufacturer's instructions. Below are some general maintenance tips.

Smoke alarm powered by a 9-volt battery

- Test the alarm monthly.
- Replace the batteries at least once every year.
- Replace the entire smoke alarm every 10 years.

Smoke alarm powered by a 10-year lithium-ion (or "long-life") battery

- Test the alarm monthly.
- Replace the entire smoke alarm according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Smoke alarm that is hardwired into your home's electrical system

- Test the alarm monthly.
- Replace the backup battery at least once every year.
- Replace the entire smoke alarm every 10 years.

What should I do if my smoke alarm sounds while I am cooking?

Never take the battery out of your smoke alarm while cooking! If a smoke alarm sounds while you are cooking or taking a shower with lots of steam, do not remove the battery. You should:

- Open a window or door and press the "hush" button.
- Wave a towel at the alarm to clear the air.
- Move the entire alarm several feet away from the kitchen or bathroom.

Disabling a smoke alarm or removing the battery can be a deadly mistake. ■

The Lenoir City Finance Department has been busy accepting payments for the 2022 and 2023 property taxes. Below are some important dates that you may need to know about in the future.

PROPERTY TAX INFORMATION:

2022 PROPERTY TAX:

March 15, 2024 – Last day we will accept payments for the 2022 taxes.

April 1, 2024 – We will turn over our 2022 to the Loudon County Clerk and Master's Office.

2023 PROPERTY TAX:

March 1, 2024 – Taxes become delinquent

and a penalty of 1.5% will be added each month until paid.

TAX RELIEF:

April 5, 2024 – Anyone wanting to apply for tax relief that qualify may do so until this date.

Lenoir City Codes Enforcement & Planning

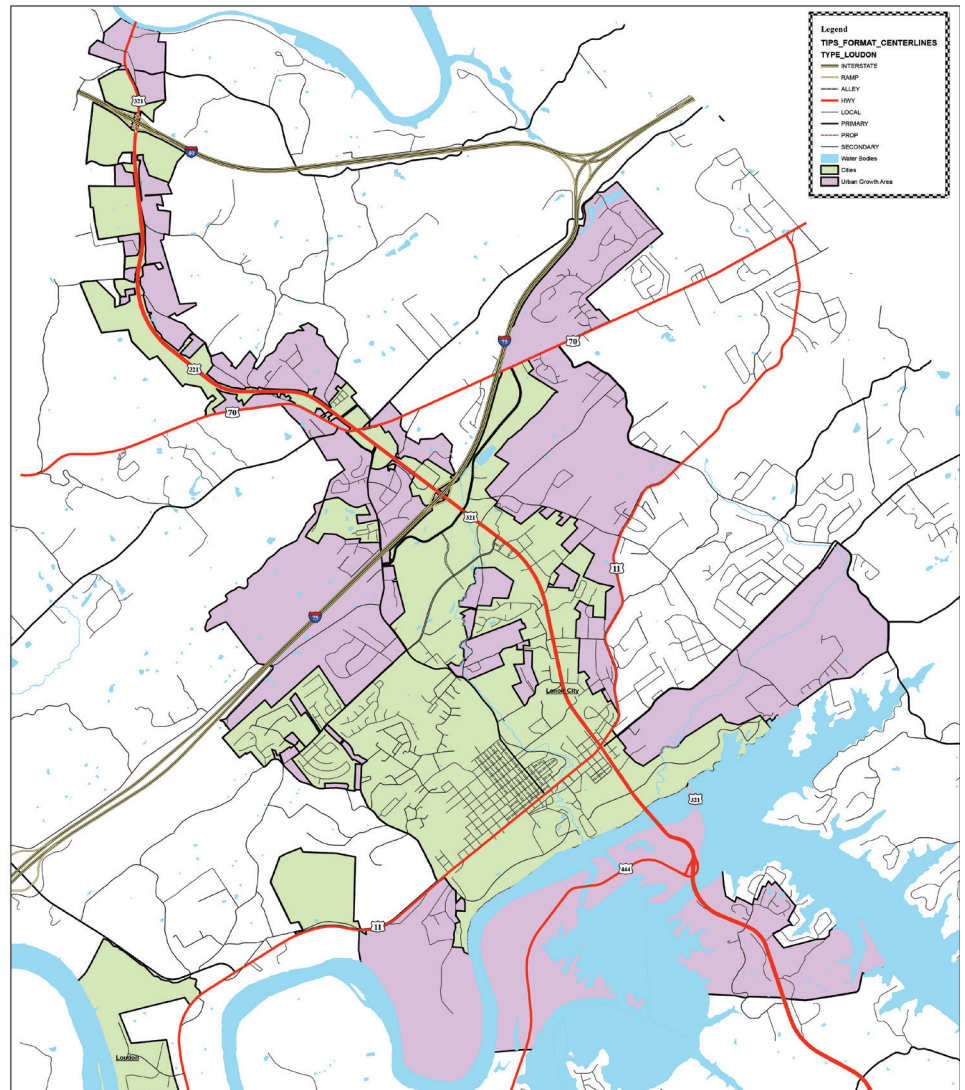
An Urban Growth Area (sometimes referred to as an Urban Growth Boundary) is an overlay area adjacent to a city limit. The State of Tennessee created this many years ago to regulate different aspects of planning.

If a property owner owns land in this overlay, then there may be different steps to take when developing their property. State law dictates rules and regulations for Urban Growth Areas. Most cities in Tennessee have this overlay. It may be confusing to the property owner as to why they must receive city approval for something on their land in the county. Certain requests will only be heard by the city, others will be heard only by the county, and still others may be heard by both entities. Variances and Special Exceptions will be heard by the county board of zoning appeals (BZA) only. Building permits will only be handled by the county codes office.

Stormwater is handled by the county codes office and/or TDEC. Site Plans for commercial, industrial, and multi-family developments are heard by the city planning commission only. Subdivision plats are only handled by either the city planner or the city planning commission depending on the number of lots involved.

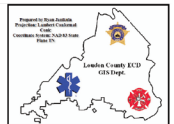
Annexations are handled by the city planning commission and city council. All annexations must be the desire of both the property owner and the city. If either entity does not want the annexation, then it cannot be done per state law. There are no forced annexations. Rezoning goes through both the city and county planning boards and the county commission. Any items that need to be reviewed and approved are discussed between the city and county planning/codes offices to assure that both departments are aware of the requests and that all regulations are being met.

One misunderstood facet of the UGA/UGB is that even if the item falls under the city's review and approval it is still under the county's regulations. As such a new subdivision that is in the county but falls within the city's growth area still

must meet county regulations for lot size, setbacks, density, and so forth.

The Urban Growth map shown illustrates Lenoir City in green, Loudon County in white, and the growth area in purple. I encourage you to look at your property on the map to determine where it falls and reach out to the planning department with any questions.

The City's Codes Officer would like to remind citizens that properties are required to be maintained free from weeds and grass growth more than

twelve (12) inches. If your property is not maintained, you may receive a violation letter and could possibly be cited into court.

Lenoir City Public Works Department

We are moving past the cold Winter season and into the Spring time! This is always a busy time of year for our department as temperatures warm up.

We will be bidding out our annual paving very soon. We have identified several streets and alleyways that will be milled and paved. In addition to the annual paving, our crews will be doing pot hole repairs along the roadways. You will also notice that our crews are mowing, weed eating, and doing litter pick-up along the roadways. Please be mindful and careful as you drive around them. We want everyone safe!

As a reminder, we have had recent issues with loose household garbage around trash cans, and some residential areas where there are no garbage cans being used. Please remember to place all garbage in bags and in an approved garbage can and have it placed outside your home either the night before your collection day or by 6:00 AM on the morning of your garbage collection. If it is not placed in a bag and in a garbage can, animals are able to get into it and scatter the garbage all over the streets. Our department, then, must rake it and clean it up. Please be mindful of this as you put your household garbage out to be collected.

Finally, we want to request your assistance in watching for people that may be hauling garbage and debris into our City from outside the City limits and dumping brush and garbage on the roadsides and alleyways. If you see this activity taking place, please call City Hall at 865-986-2715.

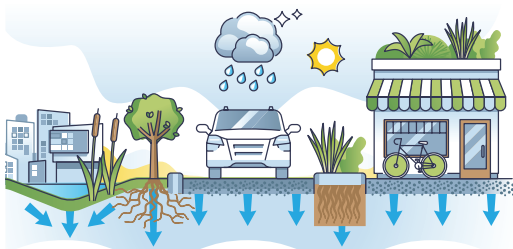

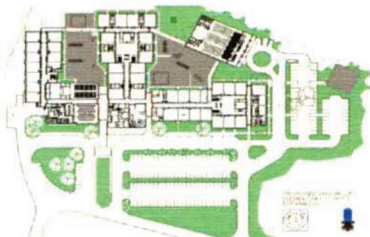

As the Director of Lenoir City Schools, I am writing to share with you the school board's plan to meet the needs of the school system as we grow throughout the Lenoir City School system. Our school district has been recognized by the Tennessee Department of Education as a "fast-growing" system. The actual data shows that we have grown 6.08% since this time last year. To meet the academic and programmatic needs of students in PreK-12 grades, the school board has approved a growth plan that will **expand Lenoir City Elementary School, expand Lenoir City Intermediate and Middle School, and expand opportunities at Lenoir City High School.**

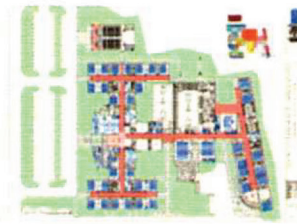
The school system has been very strategic in our use of funds by spending over \$9 million in renovations in the past three years. We have accomplished this without borrowing any money. We have written grants, refinanced debt, and saved over \$2M in energy expenses for the district. **I am asking for your support** as we join with the city council to fund **additions to our schools.** There will be a **special election on Saturday, April 13th,** where I ask you to vote **FOR** an increase in the local sales tax, which will be paid by all who visit our city. The increase is less than a penny per dollar on purchases.
